



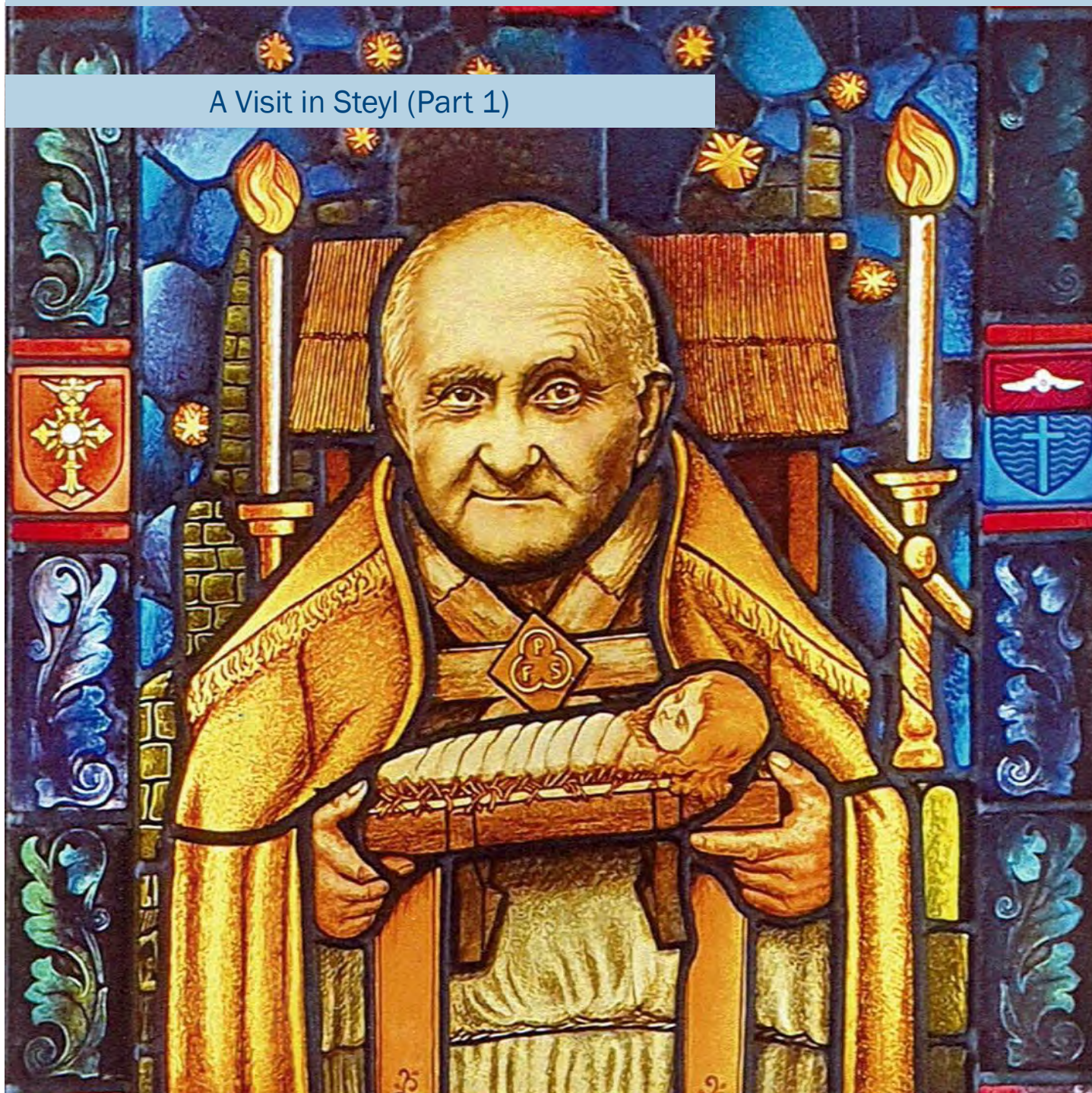

Chaos at Christmas!

It's the first Christmas night. And it's chaos in Bethlehem. Israelites from all over Palestine are pouring in this little town. Mary and Joseph are traveling in a caravan, with Mary riding much of the trip on a donkey. It's roughly an 80-mile journey to Bethlehem from Nazareth in Galilee. The nights are cold. The atmosphere surrounding the little town of Bethlehem is laden with fear of tyranny, loss of freedom and uncertainty about what lay ahead. Why has the emperor Caesar Augustus ordered a census at this time? More taxes? More oppression? More domination? Nobody is sure. Amidst this chaos and questions, Mary and Joseph reach Bethlehem. They desperately look for shelter as Mary is close to giving birth. But there is no place anywhere. They have to make do with a dark, smelly, cold stable.

Then it happened! Against that gloomy setting; in the cold and chaos, the Holy Light of Bethlehem arrived! A thrill of expectations being realized and a weary earning to rejoice! In the middle of all of the chaos, Peace was born in the form of a baby. He is the Hope born in to the world. Jesus, God among us! It was not a picture-perfect time when God sent His Son. But it was the right time.

It's not a picture-perfect time now. The chaos continues. Several countries are churning with ideological and political turmoil. Narrow nationalism and arrogance is threatening a fragile peace. Humans hating humans is slowly getting established as a new religion. Powerful nations are unwilling to stop exploiting the environment. Researchers are struggling to tally mortality statistics as the coronavirus pandemic still rages. Uncertainty, chaos, questions are all with us. And yet, this is the right time to accept the invitation of Christmas. The invitation to journey. The invitation to search. The invitation to give birth. The world awaits the birthing of its renewal, where equality, justice, love and peace will shine brightly.

A Visit to Steyl

Part 1: The Village Center and the Mission House St. Michael

In this and following issues the special topic will deal with Steyl, the roots of the congregation and its tradition. In four parts we will visit the village of Steyl with the Mission House St. Michael,

the parks and St. Gregor, the Sacred Heart Convent and the Holy Spirit Convent.



The statue of Christ on the village square near the Mission House St. Michael, unveiled in 1928, depicted as a divine sower. It is a dedication to Arnold Janssen and his greenery. The copper plate on the pedestal commemorates the sending of the first two missionaries Josef Freinademetz and Johann Baptist Anzer to China in 1879.



It took 38 years for the mission house to reach its present size. It was enlarged in several construction phases according to the respective requirements. Construction began in 1876 and the last phase was completed in 1914. In the 1980s, necessary modernisation work was carried out, including lowering the entrance to street level.



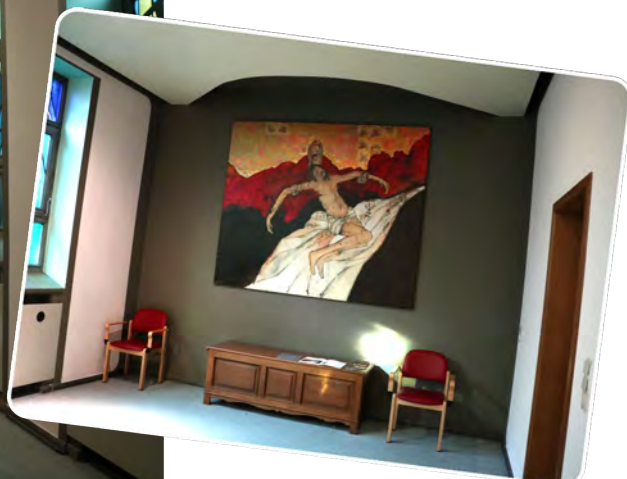
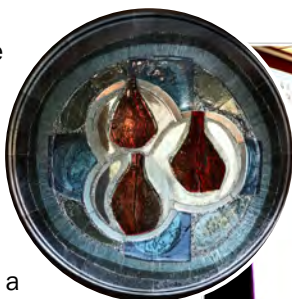
The mission house today and around 1900 without the south wing which is now the home of the guesthouse Centrum St. Michael (CSM).



The entrance hall with a painting of Arnold Janssen at his desk. At the wall in his back a painting of Steyl. Next to the painting on the Plexiglas panes, "Peace be with you" is written as a welcome greeting in many languages. And five stools, representing the five continents, offer the possibility of a short rest.

The rector's office is located on the first floor. Next to the door is a round window with symbols for the Trinity (three circles / trefoil) and the Holy Spirit (tongues of fire).

From here, the corridor branches off to the former living quarters of Arnold Janssen. Today they are a chapel, the Oratorium. A bronze plate with the Latin inscription REV. P. ARNOLDUS JANSSEN HIC HABITAVIT ANNO 1878-1905 is a reminder of this. (Rev. Fr. Arnold Janssen lived here. In the years 1878-1905).





In the corridor by the Oratorium next to the memorial slab is a display case with a swaddled baby Jesus. This baby Jesus was carried into the church every Christmas by Arnold Janssen for matins. This is commemorated by a window in the old sacristy of the upper church. A picture of this window is the cover picture of this issue.

A special feature is the church of St. Michael. From the ground plan it is only one church, but since this area was not sufficient for a rapidly growing community and there was no space for a larger church, it was built higher and two churches were created one above the other, the upper and the lower church. Arnold Janssen was able to reach the upper church via a small staircase near his living quarters. Here he had a prayer stool at a side altar directly behind the main altar. So he could go into the church at any time of the day or night without being disturbed or disturbing anyone.

The upper church was originally the church for the fathers. Today it is only used for special occasions such as the celebration of religious jubilees and ordination anniversaries. It is still decorated as it was during Arnold Janssen's lifetime, in the neo-Gothic style.



The lower church, originally the church of the brothers and pupils, is now the church of the community for Liturgy of the Hours and Holy Mass. It was modernized in 1972. Since the canonisation, the sacrophagus of Arnold Janssen is also located there. The church is also freely accessible to all worshippers during the day.

The SVD mission week ended up with our special fundraising for the SVD mission at St. Benedict Parish, Malamulele.

Mission Rosary Month and Online Rosary

The Malamulele SVD lay partners led and participated in praying the Online Rosary organised by Fr. Jay de Leon, SVD for the month of October. The lay partners took turns on every Saturday to pray with other lay partners from South African countries, viz., Zambia, Zimbabwe, Botswana, South Africa and Madagascar.

Outreach Programme

Though we are still lacking in financial resources, we received blessings from Good Samaritans, the “Limpopo Indian Community”, who donated some funds through our parish priests. We managed to identify the needy in the community, especially within Catholic members and few non-Catholics, and bought some groceries for them. Fr. Marsel Samon, SVD, Elizabeth Baloyi and lay partners helped in packing groceries for distribution.

Associação de Leigos Missionários do Verbo Divino – Missionary Month of October



Associação de Leigos Missionários do Verbo Divino in Angola participated in three meetings: two international and one regional held virtually. Through these meetings, we received orientations from the Generalate on our work as lay missionaries and we also shared our experiences. In addition, we had a meeting with our Spiritual Director who gave us an overview of the current situation of the Association and informed us that the province is working to approve the statutes of the lay associates.

Missionary Rosary

It is worth to note that the activities marking the celebrations of the mission month were held in modest ways. Due to security reasons and the restrictions of COVID-19, we did not organize the usual missionary vigil. However, we planned to carry out missionary rosary prayers in harmony with our brothers and sisters of Mozambique on Saturdays from 5 to 6 pm (Angola time) until the end of the mission month.

We also held a session to discuss the message of Pope Francis for the World Mission Day.



Mission Animation

In the context of mission animation, we organized the celebration of Mission Sunday on 24th October. On this day, we displayed in procession the symbols and traditional artefacts of mission, to portray our call to be missionaries. In his presentation, our Spiritual Director who animated the celebration, talked about the missionary works of the Divine Word Missionaries all over the world, and in Angola in particular. He highlighted the theme and activities of the SVD General Chapter, the guidelines of Pope Francis and the directives of the Bishops of Angola that dedicate the triennium to children. He appealed to the Christians to give themselves more to Christ's mission. Religious articles on St. Arnold Janssen were distributed and fundraising appeals were made to support the missions. There was a strong appeal to parishes in the urban centres to sponsor mission work in remote areas of the country. The celebration ended with launching of the Synodal process in the parish.

As part of our social activities, we mobilized lay groups to offer a solidarity meal to the needy and underprivileged in the community. We closed the mission month with recreational and sporting activities.

The SVD Associates (AsSVD) – Introduction



In order to support the missionary work of the SVD, the lay partners experience a close collaboration with the Divine Word Missionaries in the country. Considering our commitment with Christ and the challenges of mission in the Togo/Benin Province and in the world, we, the lay people, formed an association of the SVD lay partners - The SVD Associates (AsSVD) - that shares the charism of SVD. In Togo, AsSVD was established on 13th March 2015, it has currently 38 members.

Aim and Purpose

The aim of AsSVD is to support the missionary work of the SVD so as to respond to the call of lay missionaries in the Catholic Church, accompanying SVDs in their mission of evangelization and supporting SVDs in their apostolate.

Means of Action

Spiritual and apostolic endeavours; volunteering; income generating activities, etc.

Membership

Membership in the Association is open to every catholic lay faithful who is ready to contribute to the promotion of the SVD



mission in Togo and worldwide. Before becoming a member, a written request must be submitted to the office; and after a thorough study, a membership card will be given to the new member. The executive office comprises: President, General Secretary, two Reporters, Treasurer, Vice-treasurer and two in charge of the organization.

As we look ahead to the next year, we wish to deepen our commitment as SVD lay partners by conducting Retreats, Recollections and Bible study. Disciples of the Divine Word (Mumbai) – Be Rich by Giving

Disciples of the Divine Word (DDW), from its very inception, were moved by one thought, "No one has the right to be happy alone." Moved by the same philosophy, it started a program on 8th September, 2019, called "Feed the Hungry."

Why the poor in our lives? Those who have the eyes of faith realize that God has identified himself with the hungry, powerless and the unloved.

Jesus is the partisan of the poor ([Hans Küng](#)) therefore our faithfulness to Jesus has to take us where there are the hungry, unloved and the powerless. Jesus has told us "Whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" ([Mt. 25:40](#)).

Paguyuban Soverdia Timor – Strengthening the SVD Lay Partners in three Districts of Timor Province



From 27 to 30 September 2021, the Mission Secretary of the Timor Province, Fr. Agustinus Hironimus Daesoro, SVD together with the coordinator of the Timor SVD lay partner group, Isidorus Lilijawa and the head of Producers Cooperative of St. Arnold Janssen, Br. Engel Nadut, SVD visited three districts in SVD Timor Province.

On the first day, we visited the city of SoE, the capital of South Central Timor Regency. The SVD lay partner group of SoE was inaugurated on 29th January 2020. Marselinus Seran is the Chairman. During the pandemic, there were a few activities, only regular prayers and fundraising for the mission.

Second day we met the lay partners of Kefamenanu District in North Central Timor Regency. During the visit a new committee of the lay partners of TTU was formed. Gabriel Olin is the Chairman.

On the third day, we went to Atambua in Belu District. We met the SVD lay partners at the SVD novitiate at St. Yosef Nenuk, Atambua. The members have formed a temporary committee to communicate and coordinate before the formation of an official group.



During our visit, we shared information on the SVD lay partners and their commitment in the mission. We also spoke about the first SVD lay partners gathering in Tagaytay, in November 2019. We discussed on the future actions and work programs of the group in Timor.

To conclude our visit, we had a social gathering with the Producers' Cooperative of St. Arnold Janssen. The members of this cooperative are SVD priests, brothers and lay partners. The purpose of establishing this cooperative is not only to develop the SVD mission, but also to increase the income and empower the members.

From this three-day agenda, we are grateful for the collaboration between SVDs and the lay partners.

Persaudaraan Misioner Sang Sabda (PMSS) – Pilgrimage with Mother Mary

Koe" at the Holy Spirit Parish of Labuan Bajo.

With such an activity, we believe that Mother Mary will always walk with us throughout our life-time. We surrender ourselves to walk with her, because we believe that she being by our side, we will always find happiness, especially in the form of a 'solution' from every problem in our life.

The Lay Society of St. Arnold Janssen (LSSAJ) – COVID Fatalities and Challenges



The record-breaking tallies of daily COVID-19 cases fueled by the highly contagious Delta variant during the second quarter of 2021, wrought havoc in the lives of everyone.

Our former President Fabs Pagaduan and his entire family were severely affected. His only brother succumbed, tragically followed by Cecile, wife of Fabs, a very active leader of LSSAJ. Fabs is still recuperating at this time.

Former Chairman, Elmer Sarmiento, current Chairman Charles Avila and his family, former BOD member Architect Felino “Jun” Palafox and several other members were also hit by this monstrous virus. With God’s mercy, they recovered.

In my own family, we lost three members, one of whom was Fr. Victor C. Leones, SVD, the first Filipino SVD missionary to Ghana, where he devoted a half century of his life.

SVD priests and SSPS nuns were not exempted. Twenty-six of the SSPS tested COVID positive, four of whom eventually died. Four retired SVD priests also tested positive at the SVD retirement home (Villa Cristo Rey); one died. Pink Sisters Convent and the Villa Cristo Rey were ordered locked down for several weeks.

In the midst of this battlefield, prayers were the best shield. Keeping close in God’s presence gives us comfort and provides hope. LSSAJ, together with the XVD Family Rosary Movement



continued to pray the rosary. We pulled our resources to support the needs of SSPS and Villa Cristo Rey community.

Our poverty alleviation program provides skills training to rescued street dwellers particularly in the making of organic medicine capsules of moringa and other medicinal leaves. We support the livelihood project initiated by Fr. Ben Beltran, SVD by selling organic fruits and vegetables produced by the Agtas, a group of indigenous people. We also support, feeding of the hungry, use of firefighting equipment, legal and political aid, religious and social webinars, recollections and group sessions.

The battle against the COVID-19 pandemic rages on. But the assurance of God’s sheltering place allows us to weather this particular storm of life with hope. When we learn to lean upon Him, instead of worry and fear, He will see to our needs (Phil. 4:6-7, 19). He will never fail us nor turn us away empty-handed (Matt 7:7-11).

It is in this light, the SVD-PhN Mission Partners has intensified its presence on the web, particularly on different social media platforms where netizens spend most of their time.

The challenges and limitations by COVID-19 has inspired us more, to look beyond and find ways, where we can reach out to more people, be present in their daily lives.

The Philippines (PHS)

Collaboration Between SVDs and SVD Lay Partners

The celebration of SVD Mission Week in PHS this year started on 31st August 2021, with Novena Mass in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The online prayer activities were facilitated by the DYRF, the official radio station of the Province. There was a video-making contest that encouraged SVD communities and institutions within the Province to showcase the collaboration between SVDs and lay partners and at the same time promote vocation to the Society.

On the morning of 4th September 2021, Mission Conversations took place. Three missiologists were invited to give their reflections on selected topics. At the same time, four SVDs were chosen to share their missionary experiences based on the shared issues. Five lay partners participated in the Lay Partners Assembly held on the afternoon of 4th September. They came from Cebu, Bohol, Surigao City, Trento and Veruela. Fr. Roger Bag-ao, Provincial Superior of PHS, gave an input. He encouraged the lay partners and showed them the direction to be further led in helping the SVDs.

The celebration culminated with a family mass wherein the jubilarians of the Province were honoured. Then followed by a

Switzerland (ECP)

Freundeskreis der Schweizer Steyler Missionare – Bye-Bye Marienburg



Year 1961. I entered, at 15 years old, the SVD Minor Seminary of Marienburg. There we lived like little monks. Besides classes and homework, there were daily prayers, Sunday liturgies with Gregorian Chant and other wonderful music, Spiritual Readings and hours of silence. Missionaries of all the continents visited us and told about their lives. So, I emerged into the atmosphere of the world-wide SVD.

In 1929, the SVD bought the Weinburg (castle of Wine) in Thal, near the lake of Constance. They gave it a new name: Marienburg – castle of Mary. They opened the Minor Seminary. Since then, many dozens of young men entered the SVD and became missionaries all over the world, some teachers in the Marienburg and others priests in the parishes. Many former students are engaged as parish priests, as catechists or as lay people in the Dioceses of Switzerland. Even our Bishop of St. Gallen, Markus Büchel, is one of the former students.

Now the day has come, when the SVD had to close the high school and to sell the Marienburg. Too few students. Merely a handful SVD fathers. Lack of financial support by the government. Three of the fathers will now move to the SVD-House Maria Hilf in Steinhausen, where they celebrated “100 Years SVD in Switzerland”. The other priests of the Marienburg will continue with their parish work in our region.

Marienburg was also the center of our SVD – Freundeskreis, with more than 1100 members. Here we met every year. Had contact with many missionaries – and also with the SSps. On Mission Sunday, 24th October 2021, we had our last Holy Mass in the Chapel of the Marienburg. With our Provincial, Fr. Stephan Dähler, we thanked God for many blessings. An Ad-hoc-Chorus gave praise. With more than 200 friends, we took farewell from the Marienburg. But our mission - the contact, support and collaboration with the SVD, goes on.

Slovakia (SVK)

Misijná Rodina - Activities and Visit from the Generalate

In Slovakia, we have several groups of SVD lay partners in the country. They were established mostly in parishes closely associated with the SVD missionaries. Though the beginning was around 2009, *Misijná Rodina* (**Missionary Family**) was officially established with its name, in 2015.

The groups have different structure for members. Each group does different activities and these activities are adapted to the needs of the individual parish. To each group one SVD priest is assigned to help with our spiritual growth. We also have one special group called the prayer community of mothers in Rimavská Sobota. They pray for particular missionaries and financially support SVD. All groups are guided by the Mission Secretary in Nitra.

Activities

1. Regular meetings: With prayers, Bible sharing/Lectio Divina, talks on SVD spirituality, etc. We also plan for future events.
2. Spiritual activities: Retreats, Eucharistic Adoration, prayers for missionaries and SVD missions.
3. Other activities: *Misijný jarmok* - Mission fair. It is a very popular activity organised during Advent to raise funds to support the missions overseas. Every Sunday after the morning Mass, we prepare coffee for people visiting the Church. It is the time to meet people, make friends, to strengthen relationships and create new ones. We help to organise other community activities - feast days, Mission Sunday, Deaconate and Priestly Ordinations and we also help everywhere where the SVD community and people need help.

SVD-Partner – World Day of the Poor 2021: Prayer Bridge and Pilgrimage in Everyday Life



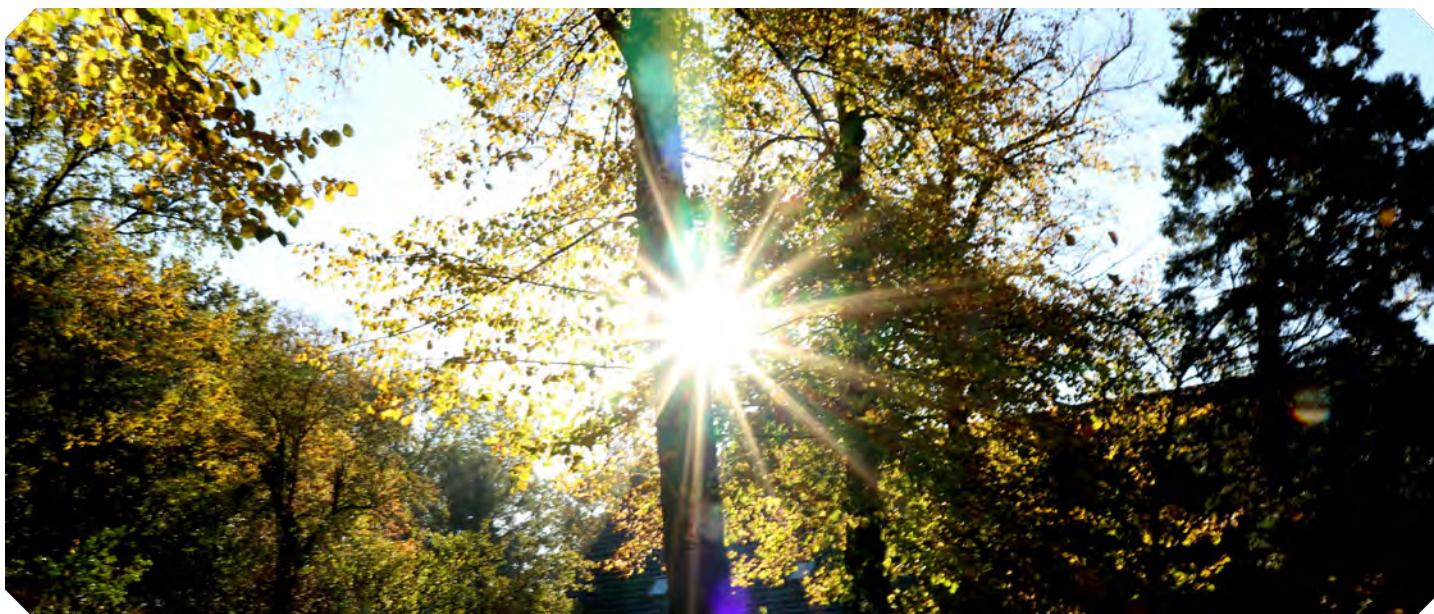
On the occasion of the 5th World Day of the Poor, SVD-Partner again invited to an International Prayer Bridge. The prayer, the impulse text and the novena intercessions took up the motto “The poor you always have with you” and could be downloaded in German, English, Spanish and French from the website. In addition, the prayer was again translated into another language, this time Urdu. The translation was done with the support of Bishop Samson Shukardin OFM from Hyderabad / Pakistan. There was also feedback from Russia and India that the prayer for the local people had been translated into Russian and Kokborok. (Kokborok is the native language of the Tripuri people of the Indian state of Tripura and neighbouring areas of Bangladesh).

New was the invitation of the SVD-Partner and Steyler Freundeskreis Swiss to a seven-week pilgrimage. In preparation for the World Day of the Poor, the group went on pilgrimage in everyday life, i.e. each person went on pilgrimage for a certain time from Monday to Friday, wherever he/she happened to be. They used the virtual pilgrimage app developed by the Association of Christian Churches in Germany (ACK). At the weekend, all met in a virtual hostel and

exchanged ideas in the chat café. In addition, every Sunday evening an impulse was sent to all by e-mail to take with on the way through the week.

Pilgrimage in everyday life was a new experience for everyone. Sometimes there were technical problems with the app to overcome, and sometimes it was a special challenge to find the time for pilgrimage. But it was not compulsory to walk, it was mainly about taking time for oneself and engaging with the intentions of the World Day of the Poor. This could also be prayer and meditation. So, it is not surprising that a pilgrim celebrated her 90th birthday during this time.

Amigos do Verbo na Amazônia (AVA) – Introduction



What is AVA?

Amigos do Verbo na Amazônia is a group of lay people committed to the Divine Word mission, through the spirituality and missionary charism of St. Arnold Janssen and the Arnoldus family.

How did AVA come about?

It came about from meetings with lay people between 2005 and 2010, the 2010 SVD Congress (Santarém-PA) and support from the Divine Word Missionaries.

Objectives

- To follow the Word guided by the Holy Spirit, and to create a deep missionary spirit through prayer, witness of life and sharing among the members and with the poor.
- To promote prophetic dialogue with all people.
- To help awaken religious vocations and missionary volunteerism.
- To pray for the priests, religious and seminarians of the Divine Word.

How Does AVA Work?

- AVA elects a coordinator from the parish or pastoral area. The coordinators of the groups form the coordination of AVA Regional (District)
- AVA and the base groups are financed through membership fees, voluntary donations and fundraising.
- AVA participates in SVD Assemblies and Retreats.
- The grassroot groups promote popular devotion to St. Arnold and St. Joseph and share the traditional prayers of the congregation.
- AVA groups help develop the SVD profile in parishes and communities, marked by Missionary Animation, Biblical Ministry, JPIC and Communication.
- AVA participates in meetings, celebrations of the SVDs, missionary activities, collaboration in the awareness campaigns of the Church and missionary solidarity.

Challenges and Joys

Geographical distance, few lay missionaries for the mission, lack of knowledge of the SVD in some parishes and missionary areas, lack of family support and finances are our challenges.

Formation of AVA groups with the advice of the SVD missionaries, solidarity and support among members of AVA and SVDs who work in the region, are our joys.

Mexico (MEX)

Misioneros Auxiliares del Verbo Divino (MAVD) – Region A: A Story That Needs to Be Told



Jalisco is a state in western Mexico bordering the Pacific Ocean. The state is known for the mariachi music and tequila that are said to have been born here. The capital, Guadalajara, has colonial plazas and iconic sites, such as the neoclassical Degollado Theatre and the majestic Guadalajara Cathedral.

Following God's call to missionary activity, in a laity way, a group of people met with Fr. Manuel Myvett, SVD, the then Mission Secretary of Mexico Province of the Divine Word Missionaries, on Sunday, 21 February, 1982, at the *Templo Expiatorio* in the city of Guadalajara, Jalisco. There was born, in a very simple way, the missionary movement that took later the name of *Misioneros Auxiliares Del Verbo Divino (MAVD)*.

Our Base Groups

Group *Santa Faustina Kowalska* from Zapopan, was formed in 1995. We are currently seven members. (Arturo, Lety, David, Arantza, Luisa, Sofi and Karol).

Group *San Alberto Magno* from Guadalajara, was formed on 3rd November, 2003 at the bookstore of the Divine Word Missionaries. On 10th November, 2012 we moved to the Church

This is the invitation and the challenge for all of us missionaries in these times of pandemic.

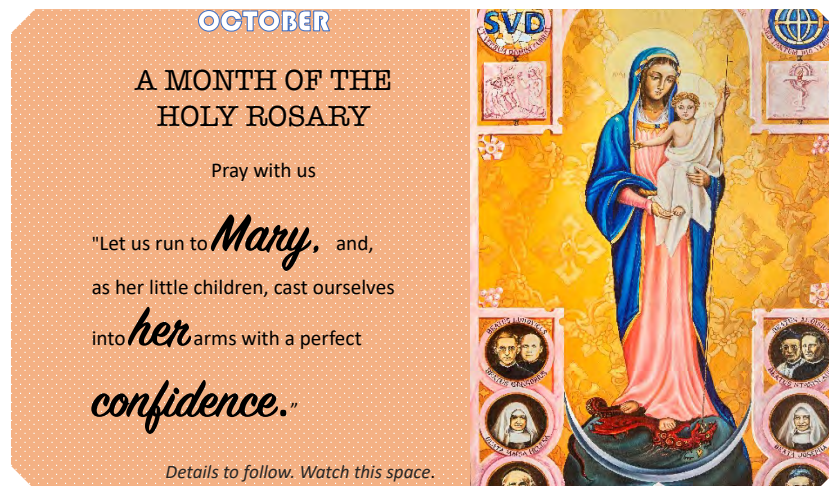

How long have you known the Divine Word Missionaries and how did you get to know them?

Living with the Marginalised

30 Years Working in Cebu (The Philippines)



Our work started some 30 years ago with encounters of people living and suffering in one of Cebu's garbage dumping sites. Something had to be done, we felt, to help these people and among them particularly the children, elderly and sick.

Over the years, we got to know more and more poor communities, families, and individuals. Among them were those in other garbage dumping sites, in impoverished fishing and farming villages, in city slums, those living along rivers, in cemeteries, people in the streets, and then children and young women suffering in Cebu's red-light districts as victims of human trafficking. Also, a steadily growing number of people living with HIV/AIDS and more recently those suffering from the COVID-19 pandemic became a genuine concern.

It was trying "to step into the shoes" of these people, making friends, journeying with them in their day-to-day lives and miseries that opened our eyes. The people themselves taught us what they needed and then also educated us how meaningful and relevant help had to be given.

Like everybody else getting involved with the poor, soon we realized that we could really help only those who were willing to help themselves. The poor had to do their part and, moreover, become protagonists in working on their own development. Having friends on their side who showed genuine interest in their plight worked wonders and encouraged many of the poor. We experienced too that journeying with the poor would not



only slowly improve their situation but that it would also transform us. We learned that human-made suffering can be changed by humans, if they join hands, enter into dialogue, are willing to learn from each other, and partner with others. We realized that even in seemingly hopeless situations and in the face of enormous challenges, in spite of our limitations, we could contribute and make a difference in the lives of those who suffer, independent of our age, profession, background, language, culture, and color.

Daily encounters with the poor in more and more communities made us reflect on what better ways there could and should be to help. In 1999, we organized an NGO, named Justice, Peace & Integrity of Creation – Integrated Development Center (JPIC-IDC) as a faith-based Non-Government Organization (NGO). We wanted to do more and this more systematically in partnership with the poor and also to give a chance to ever more volunteers to put their faith into action.

It is probably not merely the numerous projects and all those hundreds of people who have benefitted that count. Equally important, what cannot really be measured, is that all of this has given meaning to so many lives, including those who shared so generously; and that many others have been inspired to also get involved in helping the poor with creative projects on their own. For a faith-based NGO like JPIC-IDC, all the achievements serve as "testaments to God's love for humankind" and the credit is due to Him.
